Kaukauna Area School District believes that ensuring equity for all learners is part of our responsibility as a public school district. As stated in KASD Board Policy 887 – Diversity and Multicultural Relations:

"The Kaukauna Area School District has a commitment to pursue a learning and working environment in which differences are recognized and respected. These differences must not be the basis of discrimination against anyone participating in Board-sponsored activities. The school district shall foster an

environment where students, school, personnel, and other community members work together to create understanding, appreciation, respect and concern for all human beings."

Like many tenets of our system, we're still learning and growing in this area. Data from the District's Special Education Disproportionality report, gaps in student achievement between student groups as assessed by the 2020-21 Department of Public Instruction School Report Cards, newly-adopted State Standards for English Language Arts (which focus on improving equity to improve learning), and recently-revised Social Studies Standards, along with advocacy from concerned staff have helped guide the District toward a renewed focus on awareness and learning.

During the 2020-2021 school year, the District formed a committee of 14 staff members committed to developing a comprehensive equity plan for the District to better meet the varied needs of all enrolled students.

Last summer, the committee, using funds from an annual federal grant, sought help in the form of a guide through this journey, selecting Kim Walters and Demetri Beekman from the CESA 6 Center4All. The team has already planned a three-year strategic process to meticulously work toward the plan (and measurable accountability). Action steps are already underway, which include an Intercultural Development Inventory in which staff and Board members participated, along with Equity Walks at schools.

We are prepared to listen, to learn, and to grow.

The Kaukauna Area School District will educate students to be effective life-long learners who can successfully meet the challenges of their lives and be positive contributors to society.

The Equity Walks, along with stakeholder input sessions and open-door drop-in listening sessions, are a way for our consultants to gather information from each of our schools and stakeholders from around the District in order to better assess, analyze and recommend areas for growth surrounding existing equity practices within our schools. We expect, over the next three years, to learn and build greater awareness and intercultural competence for staff, and to be more culturally responsive within our classrooms in order to ensure our schools are welcoming and create a sense of belonging for each child that enters a KASD building.



Q: Is this work the first step toward teaching Critical Race Theory in KASD classrooms?

First and foremost, the answer to this is no, CRT is not a part of KASD's curriculum nor the core standards within the State of Wisconsin. Here is what we *are* required to teach regarding concepts of race and diversity within our curriculum:

Wis. Stat. § 118.01(2)(c)8 mandates that school districts provide an instructional program to give pupils "at all grade levels, an understanding of human relations, particularly with regard to American Indians, Black Americans, and Hispanics."

Wis. Stat. § 121.02(1)(L)4 requires that school districts, "as part of the social studies curriculum, include instruction in the history, culture, and tribal sovereignty of the federally recognized American Indian tribes and bands located in this state at least twice in the elementary grades and at least once in the high school grades."

Wis. Stat. § 121.02(1)(h) requires each school board to "provide adequate instructional materials, texts and library services which reflect the cultural diversity and pluralistic nature of American society."


Wis. Stat. § 118.01(2)(c)7 requires the school district to provide an instructional program that will give students "an appreciation and understanding of different value systems and cultures." In other words, teachers must present multiple perspectives on American history and culture and encourage students to "appreciate and understand" diverse value systems.

Critical Race Theory, or CRT, has been a topic of conversation (and animosity) over the last several months, and the conversations and arguments are gaining steam. CRT is a framework and analytical tool that originated in the 1970s to help law students think critically about the

impact of historical and present-day racism within the legal system. It has been around for decades, and more recently has entered into college-level curriculum for school administrators and teachers to help them better understand inequities in education. CRT is not the same as educational equity and does not include anything related to social-emotional learning or cultural responsiveness, values and methods that *are* used within our District classrooms to strengthen all students' sense of identity, to promote inclusivity in classrooms and schools, and to engage all students in their learning.



Educational Equity and our work with CESA 6's Center4All is not about making changes that result in reducing

opportunities for any group, but rather, helping our District get better, by eliminating barriers to success and ensuring that all students have what they need to be effective, life-long learners who can successfully meet the challenges of their lives and be positive contributors to society.

LET'S TALK ABOUT ...

DPI'S 2020-2021 REPORT CARDS

On November 16, 2021, the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) released the 2020-2021 report cards for all Wisconsin publicly-funded school and districts. Five of KASD's six ranked schools exceeded or significantly exceeded expectations. NDLC earned the "Significantly Exceeds Expectations" distinction. EQ, Park Community, Haen and River View each earned a place in the "Exceeds Expectations" category; and KHS remained in the "Meets Expectations" category. Tanner has a student body that is too young for the standardized testing used in these accountability



ratings and has earned a "Satisfactory Progress" rating in an alternate accountability process.

Because of the incredible work going on inside the walls at each of our school buildings, Kaukauna Area School District's overall accountability score again earned a rating in the "Exceeds Expectations" category.

As you look through each school report card, we hope you take the time to look at more than the overall number; For instance, KHS, whose combined score met expectations, boasts nearly 60% of students completed at least one dual-enrollment course last year; the state average is 17.8%. Their scores in both the number of students gaining an industry-recognized credential/certificate and the number of students participating in work-based learning programs far exceeded state averages as well. Additionally, the number of students that successfully completed at least one music course was nearly 40%, almost double the state average.

As in years past, we have much to celebrate. Having schools meeting, exceeding and significantly exceeding expectations during the tumultuous 2020-2021 school year is validating, and is evidence of the incredible work of both our staff and our students. It shows the resilience of which we're capable and the strength of our District and community. We will continue to celebrate those successes. Additionally, these report cards give us an idea of the work that still needs to be done to better serve all of our students. The achievement gaps between student groups district-wide present us with an opportunity to learn, to improve and to grow. We intend to do just that. SMART GIRLS ROCK!

KHS STUDENTS EXPLORE STEAM CAREERS

Science is cool.

That was the lead-in statement for the 2021 Smart Girls Rock event, put on by the Fox Cities Chamber of Commerce and hosted this year by Boldt Construction.





When our community rallies around getting girls excited about STEM, the results really ROCI




Indeed, they did, during this interactive mentoring event designed to inspire an interest in STEM careers for freshman and sophomore girls from schools around the Fox Valley, including six Kaukauna High School students: Norah Bowers, Sadie Schuh, Norah Berken, Alli Pawlowski, Alaina Knudtson and Megan Kennedy.

The day consisted of twelve 20-minute sessions led by inspirational females working in STEM-related fields throughout the Fox Cities. While students attending the event may be interested in the subjects of science, technology, engineering and math, often they're unaware of the variety of careers, historically dominated by men, in which those interests or strengths can be put to use. The goal of the Smart Girls Rock event is to change that.

From welding to crane operating, from bridge design to land management and conservation, an assortment of STEM careers were on display for the 80 students attending from high schools throughout the Fox Cities. In addition to the first-hand commentary from industry professionals and the unique hands-on experiences, the girls also talked about recommended coursework pathways, possible extra-curricular activities and post-secondary education options. By connecting students with career options in STEM fields and allowing them to try a number of the tasks they could find themselves completing within these fields down the road, Smart Girls Rock aims to inspire young women to continue to follow their passions, and at the community level, to increase female representation throughout the underrepresented STEM fields.

Fortunately, at KHS, this is only one of several events aimed to increase awareness and promote involvement in STEM fields. STEAM girls, a club created a few years ago, engages female students in fields related to science, technology, engineering, the arts and math. The group is open to all girls in grades 9-12 and meets several times each year. Within the club, elected student officials plan and organize the meetings and events. One of these events includes a day where the club invites 8th grade students to the high school for a day of learning about STEAM fields (similar to what Smart Girls Rock does for our high school students). Additionally, STEAM Girls advisors and participants hope to attend two more upcoming local events: Build Like a Girl, hosted by Miron Construction Company, Inc., and the Future Fox Cities Career Expo, both aimed at raising awareness for and promoting future STEM pathways for female high school students.
