How accurate is the screening questionnaire?

- This evidence-based screening tool was developed by Massachusetts General Hospital. Research has concluded that it is effective in identifying youth with possible emotional problems.
- However, the screening results are not a medical diagnosis. Medical diagnoses are beyond the scope of the Connected Community Wellness Screen program.

Youth mental health is important.

- As parents you are aware that the physical and mental health of young people plays a key role in their ability to succeed in school, have rewarding relationships with family members and friends, and lead productive and happy lives.
- Your School District is committed to working with you, not only to educate your children, but to ensure that they reach their full potential inside and outside of the classroom.
- We are offering freshmen students the opportunity to participate in an emotional wellness check-up called the Pediatric Symptom Checklist-Youth Self-Report (PSC-Y)
- The PSC-Y is a nationally-recognized screening tool developed by Massachusetts General Hospital to identify risk factors associated with depression, anxiety, alcohol and substance abuse and other conditions that are easily treated and often go undetected. The program is free and completely voluntary and confidential.
- The teen years are a time of tremendous change. The emotional Wellness Screen program can help parents better understand the changes their teens are experiencing. No matter what the result of your teen's screening, the program will provide you with important information.
- For most parents, this screening will reassure you that your teen is just experiencing typical "growing pains." For other parents, the screening can help you pinpoint a problem in its early stages, giving you the ability to secure needed help for your teen and reduce the chance that a more significant problem will develop in the future.

How does Connected Community Wellness Screen work?

- The screening takes place in a private setting at school.
- Your teen will not be screened without guardian permission.
- All screening results will be kept confidential, stored separately from academic records, and not shared with your teen's teachers.

There are three steps to the screening process:

- 1. Teens complete a computerized questionnaire about physical health, symptoms of depression, anxiety, suicidal thinking and behavior, and use of drugs and alcohol.
- Teens whose answers reveal a potential problem and teens who ask for help then meet with a trained mental health professional in private to determine if further evaluation would be helpful. Teens whose answers show they probably do not need help will meet briefly with program staff. During this conversation, teens may ask questions about the program and ask for help with any concerns the screening did not cover.
- 3. You will be contacted by a case manager only if your teen meets with a mental health professional. If this is the case, a case manager will share the overall results with you and discuss ways to get help for your teen. You will not be contacted if your teen is not found to need additional services.

Your school district contracts with Connected Community Wellness Screen to provide this screening at no cost, but does not provide further evaluation or treatment services. It is up to you to decide if you want to obtain any additional services for your teen. You may contact the screening staff for more information about health resources in your area.

Are my child's results confidential?

- > Yes, screening is confidential.
- In order to protect your child's privacy, his/her screening results and related files will not be stored with his/her academic records.
- Teachers will not be involved in the screening procedure.
- If program staff believes that your child is in some danger or is a danger to others, they will take action and notify appropriate personnel and/or necessary authorities.

What if I provide consent, but my child does not want to participate?

- Because we believe screening should be voluntary, your child may refuse to participate or refuse to answer any questions during the screening.
- We will notify you if your child chooses not to participate in the screening.

Does the Connected Community Wellness Screen Program recommend treatment?

- The Wellness Screen program and staff do not make treatment recommendations.
- All treatment decisions are made by families in close consultation with a health professional after the completion of the emotional wellness screen.
- Treatment recommendations are beyond the scope of the Connected Community Wellness Screen program.
