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### WRAP AROUND CARE PROVIDES OPTIONS FOR PARENTS

At the beginning of the 2015-2016 school year, the Kaukauna Area School District added a new wrap-around care program for our 4-year-old kindergarten students. The decision to move forward with the program came after discussion about providing our district's youngest children a good foundation for learning, while addressing busy parents' needs for flexibility.

With the addition of the new wrap-around care program, parents have been able to drop off and pick up their children any time between 6:30 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. Students receive supervised care before and after classes, provided by experienced and qualified staff of the YMCA of the Fox Cities (Heart of the Valley YMCA), who already partner with our district to provide before- and afterschool care at our school sites.

Our classes, now halfway through the first year, have been very successful! Currently, 55 students participate in the wrap-around care program. Students come to school ready to play and learn. They read books, play games, and have both structured and unstructured time in the morning and in the afternoon. Our goal is to make learning fun for these early learners!



KASD's wrap-around care program is located at Tanner Early Learning Center, the same school that currently accommodates the majority of the district's Early Childhood through Grade 1 classes. Care is available on weekdays from the first day of school through the last, and is also offered on district in-service and vacation days. Summer care will also be offered, staring in June 2016. All children enrolled in Kaukauna Area School District 4-year-old kindergarten are eligible to attend.

## LET'S TALK ABOUT... TECHNOLOGY

On Monday, January 25, 2016, The Kaukauna Area School District Board of Education approved a five-year technology plan. The goal of the new plan is to ensure that staff and students have the proper hardware, internet access, software and training to align technology with curriculum and needs.

The new plan, with average costs between \$450,000 and \$500,000 annually, includes the increase to one-to-one technology devices for students in grades 7-12 and one-to-three devices for students in grades 4K-6, as well as an additional 2.6 FTE staff positions to support the new tools.

The District's Technology Committee was instrumental in the development of a mission and vision for instructional technology. The group designed the plan to provide resources for diverse technologies, such that students could attain the skills necessary to be innovative and productive global and digital citizens, and staff could participate in professional development activities to help utilize best instruction practices, incorporate computers into classroom instruction in a meaningful way, and promote the safe and ethical use of technology.

Director of Secondary Education Matthew Smith is excited about what these changes mean for student achievement. "By increasing student access to technology and providing additional training and development for our staff, this new technology plan helps our teachers maximize student engagement and learning."

The additional 2.6 FTE staff positions will support the increase, allowing for full-time Library Media Specialists at Tanner Early Learning Center, River View Middle School and Kaukauna High School Libraries, and a full-time Technology Coach at the elementary level who will help support the use of technology by students and will work directly with teachers to integrate the use of technology into their daily instruction.

**Message from the Superintendent** 

Recently, Kaukauna High School held two very prominent events: The Cheesehead Wrestling Invitational and the Kaukauna

Dance Classic. Both events were very successful, and between the two, Kaukauna High School hosted several thousand visitors.

Interestingly, at both events, I was asked about our unique mascot. To paraphrase, "What is the story behind the Galloping Ghosts?"

While our school-community proudly honors the Galloping Ghost, it occurred to me that not everyone understands the significance within our community and why we are, and proudly support, the Galloping Ghosts.

"Actually, there are two versions of the story behind this mascot," I started my explanation.

I described the first story of a foggy, damp Halloween evening in the 1920s when the Kaukauna High School football team dressed in all white and, looking like a large group of ghosts, galloped over the Appleton Terrors. I then went on to tell the second story which attributes the name as an emulation of Harold "Red" Grange, a lighter than average, but very speedy football player (said to be true of Kaukauna's football players in the 1920s) known as the Galloping Ghost.

Whichever story you believe (my intention is not to start a community quarrel!), we can all appreciate and honor our unique school mascot, and continue to proudly dress in orange and black, supporting and lifting up the students of this generation. It's another part of what makes our school, our community, Kaukauna Strong.

We talked in the last Community Ghost Story about the significance of Kaukauna Strong, and the mindset it invokes at the Kaukauna Area School District.
