# MENTAL WELLNESS: A KEY PRIORITY

At Kaukauna Area School District, mental wellness is a priority. We aim to balance academic excellence with social and emotional growth and learning to prepare all students for lifelong success. Students come to school with a variety of academic, emotional and personal needs, and KASD provides multiple levels of support to best meet our students where they are.

#### **Wellness Screening**

The Kaukauna Area School District offers freshman students the opportunity to participate in an emotional health Wellness Screening, meant to identify risk factors associated with depression, anxiety, and alcohol and substance abuse. The program is free, completely voluntary and confidential.

#### **United Way PATH**

The United Way's PATH (Providing Access to Healing) for Students is a partnership between United Way Fox Cities, Family Services of Northeast WI, Inc., Lutheran Social Services, and KASD, created to offer mental health outreach and school-based counseling services.

The program goal for the United Way's PATH is, "To improve access to mental health services for children and youth experiencing barriers to care in the community."

#### **Triumph Program**

The Triumph Program is a collaboration between the Kaukauna, Kimberly and Little Chute Area School Districts. Together, they have partnered with Family Services of Northeast Wisconsin to provide educational services integrated with on-site mental health services, with the goal of helping our students in grades 9-12 have academic success.

#### **Child Psychiatry Consultation Program (CPCP)**

In March 2020, Governor Evers signed a bill allowing teachers, school counselors and administrators to address mental wellness needs in a more efficient manner, connecting school counselors with psychiatrists who can provide mental health consultations for students without the long wait times that had existed previously, providing school staff members with immediate, same-day consultation services with a child psychiatrist to better support a student in need. In addition, educational services regarding mental health could be provided to all school staff.

"It will add resources and tools to this continuum of services that we provide on a daily basis for our kids. Our student services staff works everyday with many, many kids in managing and coping through their mental illness."

The program, operated in Outagamie County by the Medical College of Wisconsin and funded by the Wisconsin Department of Health Services, is provided at no cost to families or the District.

#### CONSCIOUS DISCIPLINE AT PARK COMMUNITY CHARTER SCHOOL

Since 2012, Park Community Charter School has been practicing Conscious Discipline, a comprehensive approach to classroom management based on brain research and evidence-based, in-depth understanding of social and emotional learning. This school-family-centered approach uses an intentional shift in adult mindset and understanding of behavior as it relates to the brain to teach adults to self-regulate first, then provides specific, brain-friendly strategies for responding to each child's individual needs to help the child self-regulate and increase their sense of safety,

connection, empathy and intrinsic motivation to prepare themselves for learning.

Utilizing Conscious Discipline requires intensive training for Park Community Charter School's teachers and staff, who attend a 5-day Conscious Discipline Summer Institute prior to teaching, to learn from founder Dr. Becky Bailey in intensive, hands-on sessions.

Park Community teacher Jennie Gries has poured herself into learning and teaching this effective approach, and was recently asked to attend an invitation-only Conscious Discipline Advanced Institute in Florida; only 42 people were invited from 23 states and four countries. Jennie shared Park's journey with other attendees and received praise from Dr. Becky Bailey for the school's work. She's since been asked to speak at other national conferences. Park Community Charter School is truly grateful to Jennie for her work and her dedication to improving their school family.

In October, Park is excited to host an on-site Conscious Discipline National Conference, at which Master Instructor Elizabeth Montero-Cefalo will be presenting and running sessions.

# THE ROAD TO MIT

KHS SENIOR MICHAEL KRAUS HEADS DOWN A NEW PATH THIS FALL

This fall, Michael Kraus ('20), will head east to start his college career at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT). This highly-competitive, top-rated program is applauded for its scientific and technological training and research; and Michael has spent his time at Kaukauna High School working toward this opportunity.

During the 2018-2019 school year, Michael, along with some of his friends, built a pulse jet during engineering club. Limited by available materials, the group built a propane-powered smaller engine out of copper piping. While it was hard to build the engine using proper dimensions with these materials, they were still able to fire it up, albeit weak; this did not live up to their expectations. Rather than give up, they went on to design an appropriately-dimensioned 3D model using SOLIDWORKS, and use a 3D printer to create an actual plastic model.

"While we couldn't run the plastic model, it was a great exercise in using a CAD program to model a part and play around with its dimensions," Michael said of the project. "This project and the SOLIDWORKS class offered at the high school helped prepare me for my job at August Winter & Sons."



Through the KHS Youth Apprenticeship program, Michael earned a position at August Winter & Sons, a mechanical contractor specializing in commercial HVAC systems. Last summer, he began working on a project in which he was asked to add a new HVAC system and update parts of an existing HVAC system for a local manufacturing plant. Using sketches provided by one of the project managers at August Winter & Sons, Michael had the opportunity to bring them to life as 3D models, and ensure that the system would fit into the existing building. Since that project, Michael has continued to develop his CAD software skills, and had the opportunity to work on other projects as well.

Michael's engineering mentor, Jeff Luczek, said that during his time with the company, Michael has gained nearly four times the hours and experience that a college student would generally earn during an engineering internship with the company.

His hard work both at school and in the CTE program, and his experience beyond the high school walls as part of the Youth Apprenticeship program have been recognized by the likes of the highest-rated engineering program in the country. Best wishes, Michael, on a very successful future!
